Position Summary

We are seeking a dedicated and passionate **Program Instructor/Leader** to join our **Mongolia team**. This field-based role involves a dynamic mix of leading undergraduate academic programs, conducting conservation research, managing logistics and safety, and fostering community partnerships. The ideal candidate has a strong background in conservation science, field research, and teaching, along with excellent leadership and organizational skills. This is a live-on-site position that requires a high level of presence, responsiveness, and mentorship to undergraduate students in an immersive learning environment.

Key Responsibilities

- Develop and implement program schedules, including academic sessions and field research activities.
- Facilitate all program activities, ensuring educational value and safety.
- Design and conduct wildlife monitoring surveys in collaboration with local partners and RRCS senior staff.
- Manage logistics such as permits, equipment, and campsites.
- Oversee transportation, accommodations, and meal planning.
- Ensure safe operation and maintenance of 4WD program vehicles.
- Teach undergraduate courses such as: Applied Conservation Biology, Biological Field Methods, Community-Based Natural Resource Management, and Natural History
- Promote experiential learning and critical engagement with conservation topics.
- Mentor students in research and project writing.
- Maintain regular contact with RRCS headquarters and local partners.
- Promote a collaborative, inclusive, and respectful team environment.
- Manage program budgets and expenditures in line with organizational policies.
- Maintain accurate records of research, student progress, and incident reports.

Qualifications

- Master's degree or higher in conservation biology, ecology, environmental science, or related field.
- Proficient in field research methodologies and data analysis.
- Experience teaching undergraduate-level courses in related disciplines.
- Curriculum development and student learning assessment experience preferred.
- Strong leadership in field program coordination and safety management.
- Excellent interpersonal and communication skills.
- Ability to support students in academic and personal development.
- Commitment to fostering a supportive and inclusive environment.
- Wilderness First Aid or Wilderness First Responder certification required.
- 4WD manual transmission driving experience in rugged terrain.
- Familiarity with R and GIS software is a plus.
- Able to thrive in remote and challenging environments.
- Flexible in responding to changing conditions and program needs.
